Happenings October 2021


Dear Friends,

It might seem odd to begin an October newsletter with an article about Advent. After all, Halloween and Thanksgiving are weeks away yet. However, Advent is a season of preparation and this year there are plenty of preparations to be done!

Advent Sermon Series:

In planning for our advent sermon series this year, I wanted to include you, the congregation, in it in a significant way. Therefore, I'm asking all of you to help me write it. Yes, you!

This year I am asking members to bring me an object that makes Christmas meaningful to you. Then it is my task to create a sermon around that object. Maybe it's Christmas cards, a manger scene, candle, or other decoration or object that is meaningful to you. It could be serious or funny, large (needs to be able to fit in the sanctuary) or small. Maybe it's a food? Could it be a person? I don't know because you haven't told me yet! I hope this will be an engaging, meaningful, and fun series!

If you would like to participate, please bring your item to me by the first Sunday in November. Who knows... you might even stump the pastor!

Please also, remember that there are only 4 weeks so not all submissions may be chosen, but could still be used in some way.

Advent Bible Study:

We also will be offering a 4-week Advent bible study this year. The class will be offered as a hybrid of in person or via Zoom depending on the participants' comfort level.

Pastor Mike hopes that all our congregation members will join in reading this short study over the Advent Season even if you can't attend the weekly gatherings. It would be great to literally have everyone on the same page this year during Advent as we prepare for the coming of the Lord.


The study is a fun one too. Author <u>Matt Rawle</u> has prepared it, using Dr Suess's classic *The Grinch Who Stole Christmas.* Copies will be made available in a couple weeks. Below is a brief description of the book

The Heart That Grew Three Sizes: Find the True Meaning of Christmas in The Grinch. By:

Rediscover the gift of Advent that comes without packages, ribbons, and bows. We don't know why the Grinch hated Christmas. We just know he did. If we're being honest, there's probably something within the Christmas season celebration that awakens a Grinch within all of us. Maybe the gift we unwrap was all wrong, or memories that were supposed to be joyful never were. When everything seems wrong in the world, even joyful celebrations are much too loud. In his new Advent study, Matt Rawle explores the faith themes in the Christmas classic, How the Grinch Stole Christmas save the Grinch? Could it be that the very thing we think we hate, is the one thing that changes our life? Rediscover and reinvigorate your Christian faith this Advent and Christmas season and look at this familiar classic through the lens of faith.

Dick & Ruth Robinson have been supported by our church for a few years now. They are currently in the United States and will be joining us on Sunday, October 10 for both the 8:30 & 10:00 to share with us how their ministry in Peru is doing. We will also be taking a love offering to help support their ministry. Below is a brief biography for them.

We are missionaries in the jungle of Peru. We developed program for training indigenous leaders and pastors in Orality, a methodology that involves teaching the Word of God as spoken, chronological stories from

the

scriptures. This is also known as Narrative Theology.

We started our work in 2013 in the District of Tahuania, far upriver the city of Pucallpa where we live and have our mission center. The evangelical churches of Tahuania were dead or weak, most villages had no evangelical churches and the Catholic church was not present in the villages. At present our organization is recognized by the Shipibo-

Conibo Evangelical Church Association (AIESHC). They ordained five pastors who were trained by RiverWind. Today seven churches have been started by our students, most are being pastored by our RiverWind graduates ordained by the AIESHC. These pastors have organized a network they call the Evangelical Churches of Tahuania. Together they planted a new church this year in the toughest area where there was much alcoholism and perdition. Today there is a church in that village and one of our students was sent as pastor. Each of the other seven churches have donated corrugated iron sheets for the construction of the new church building.

Thank you very much *Iglesia* Mt. Gretna UMC for participating with us in God's mission called RiverWind.

BUT PLEASE NOTE--ZOOM calls can also be made from any cell phone by dialing in to the phone number that is in the weekly email.



Welcome Bishop John Schol



Bishop John R. Schol was raised in Philadelphia and here first in his ministry career, where his faith and leadership skills were nurtured. Here is where he developed strong values of hard work, a respect for diversity, a drive toward ingenuity and excellence, and a spirit of grace.

Bishop Schol served congregations in Saugus, Massachusetts, Philadelphia, and West Chester. In each church worship grew, mission in the community expanded with new creativity, and new disciples were made.

For 12 years he served as the Executive Director of the Frankford Group Ministry in Philadelphia. This new, emerging cooperative ministry that aligned four United Methodist congregations grew from one staff person to more than 50 staff positions. The ministry led its community in developing better race relations and providing social services, community economic development and community arts programs for human development. During and after his ministry there, the ministry also led its community in building and rehabilitating more than 200 housing units and served more than 20,000 people a year.

In the 1990s John Schol served the denomination by leading Urban Ministries at the General Board of Global Ministries. There he developed and led at least two major, successful resourcing initiatives: Communities of Shalom and Holy Boldness. The Communities of Shalom initiative started more than 1,000 sites globally and trained more than 5,000 people in church and community development. And Holy Boldness developed into a

collaborative urban ministry training and congregational development movement that served districts and conferences around the UMC connection.

Since his election in 2004, Bishop Schol has served with distinction as the Episcopal Leader of the Baltimore-Washington Conference (Washington Episcopal Area) and currently as Bishop of the Greater New Jersey Conference (New Jersey Episcopal Area). He now provides episcopal leadership to the Eastern PA Conference (Philadelphia Area), while continuing to lead Greater New Jersey.

Bishop Schol received a bachelor's degree from Moravian College and master's and doctoral degrees from Boston University. He has helped start six nonprofit organizations and served on numerous boards.

He is married to Beverly Schol, his partner in life and ministry. They have three grown children, Mark, Kristin and Rebecca, and three grandchildren. His hobbies and interests include family, reading, running, photography and travel.
